TWO THOUSAND HAPPY TAILS

Mot was 10 years old when her owners surrendered her to BHRSC. She had lived with the same family her entire life, but they did not have the money to care for her as she aged, and she was in rough shape.

The large, ulcerated, bleeding mass on her back was the most obvious of her many ailments, but we soon learned she was also suffering from ear infections, overgrown nails and severely decaying teeth, among other things.

Fortunately, we were able to take in Mot within a day of her owner contacting us. We quickly got to work with our partner veterinarians evaluating her health, beginning treatments and making her as comfortable as possible – a process and timeline that hasn't always been possible for BHRSC.



We have come a long (and short) way since our founding 20 years ago. There were times in our early days when we heard about hounds abandoned at shelters but did not have the resources to rescue them. Since then, our volunteer and donor networks have grown, making more things possible than our founders ever dreamed.

WELLNESS CHECKS

Every hound we take in receives an extensive wellness exam, including as needed blood work, urinalysis, heartworm check, fecal testing, microchip implantations and vaccinations, and often additional testing for conditions like abnormal growths and heart irregularities.

Mot's assessment found seven more masses, in addition to the obvious one on her back, and confirmed severe dental disease along with many other nagging health problems.

MAJOR MEDICAL CARE

Many of the hounds we rescue are in desperate need of care for major medical issues that require costly surgery, lengthy courses of medication and special boarding or foster care. Thanks to our generous and dedicated supporters, today we're able to accept and treat even the most severe cases.

Mot was no exception, as she needed three masses removed, the largest one coming dangerously close to her spine. Biopsies revealed she had a rare type of tumor, but good margins and no sign of metastasis after removal. She also had more than a dozen diseased teeth removed.

BEHAVIOR EVALUATIONS

Last year we made behavior evaluations part of our intake process for all hounds. This helps us identify potential issues and create appropriate training and treatment plans to prepare each hound for a happy life in a forever home.

Mot was nervous and scared when she came to us. Her evaluation pinpointed specific situations that increased her fear response, giving us a better idea of the type of foster home in which she would thrive. For many weeks, Mot's foster family worked with her as we searched for a permanent home that would bring out her best basset behavior.

Two months after her surrender, Mot was finally home with a patient and attentive family with lots of love to give and the tools needed to help her blossom. At first, she accompanied her new dad to work every day as her anxiety began to subside.

Today she shows no signs of the nerves that once troubled her. Instead, she spends her time searching the house for toys to drop at her humans' feet, singing her welcome home song and choosing between two beds to settle into for naps.



This "happy tail" is a reminder of how far BHRSC has come – rescuing, rehabilitating and rehoming more than 100 hounds each year and nearly 2,000 since our founding. Everything from our complex Hound Haul operations, to the basic, yet exceptional level of care each rescued hound receives is a tribute to those early days, made possible thanks to supporters like you.

Seventeen years ago volunteer Denise Dochnahl attended her first BHRSC Spring Games, where she said she was not only entertained, but also fell in love with every hound in attendance. At the time, her hound Stoney was the only basset she had seen in the area. So the gathering left her with "overwhelming amazement," something she still feels today when she thinks about everything the organization has accomplished since then, particularly the recent Hound Haul operations.

"I want everyone, everywhere to know that BHRSC makes a difference ... And I want them to get involved - volunteer, attend events, donate. foster, ADOPT!" 👺






